

What is Weatherization?

High energy costs are an excessive burden on low wage workers.

Weatherization, the nation's largest residential energy efficiency program, alleviates this burden and improves the standard of living for these individuals and families.

CMCA's Weatherization program is designed to assist individuals and families that earn less than 200% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines (FPG). The income ranges are based on the number of people per household and are listed below:

Household Size	Maximum Income
1	\$21,660
2	29,140
3	36,620
4	44,100
5	51,580
6	59,060

Eligible participants will receive an energy audit on their homes that will identify areas of poor air infiltration, which is a typical source of energy waste. Then, CMCA or its contractors may provide up to \$6,500 in services to improve the home's energy

What is Weatherization?

Diagnostic equipment is used to identify air infiltration, pressure imbalances and areas of heating and cooling loss.

Weatherization crew or sub-contractors install the most cost-effective energy efficiency measures based on the results of the energy audit.

Some of these measures include:

- Caulking / weather-stripping
- Repair or replacement of broken windows and doors
- Minor foundation sealing
- Carbon monoxide testing
- Insulating water heater and hot water pipes
- Attic insulation / ventilation
- Wall insulation
- Foundation, floor, and crawl-space insulation
- Furnace clean and tune or replacement



Benefits of Participation

CMCA staff not only provide the necessary repairs to improve a home's energy performance, they are committed to improving the long-term quality of health of a home. Inspectors evaluate health and safety conditions such as carbon monoxide hazards, gas leaks, or moisture problems. Staff also train the homeowners on how to maintain the work that has been done and train them on strategies to conserve energy.

How to Participate

A complete application for services should be submitted to your local Family Resource Center and include the following documents:

- Social Security cards for all household members
- Proof of household income for previous six months (not including the month you apply) for all household members
- Utility account numbers
- Proof of homeownership or landlord agreement to contribute 5% of cost of weatherization.
